

HISTORY OF THE TARLAC AGRICULTURAL UNIVERSITY



The carabao has always been the symbol of the Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU). The carabao is resilient even through the ages, synonymous to actions and sustained accomplishments that is TAU through the years. It is always good to go back to memory lane and learn how the University has weathered storms before reaching its present status.

The Institution was established in 1944 as Camiling Boys/ Girls High School. It started with 368 students, 13 faculty members, and a school principal. It stopped operation in December 1944 but resumed after the Liberation as Tarlac High School, Camiling Branch. The reopening of the school was a response to the clamor of parents whose children stopped schooling during the war years and the difficulty of traveling from Camiling to Tarlac City.

On 6 July 1945, Municipal Resolution No. 34 created the Camiling Vocational Agricultural School (CVAS) replacing Tarlac High School, Camiling Branch. Its focus on vocational agriculture was considered a means to hasten the economic recovery of the town from the ravages of the war. CVAS had 534 students and 13 faculty. From 1945 to 1948, the school offered two curricula the general academic to enable the former students to graduate and the agriculture curriculum for the first-year and second-year students.

On 26 September 1946, the school was renamed Camiling Rural High School (CRHS). In 1948, the general curriculum was phased out. Early in 1952, the Director of Public Schools served notices that the school should be relocated to a permanent site and increase the declining enrollment; otherwise, it might be closed or transferred to another town.

most conducive for an agricultural school's expansion was found in Malacampa, a barangay that is seven kilometers away from the town proper. In June 1953, the school with 155 students and eight faculty moved to the new site. Classrooms and offices were made of bamboo and nipa in the "middle of a wilderness." Funds from FOA-PHILCUSA later came and permanent buildings replaced the bamboo structures.

Expansion and development had been accelerated when CRHS was converted to Tarlac National Agricultural School (TNAS) in 1957, under a Superintendent. It became a policy to make all projects profitable - piggery, poultry, goat, and vegetables.

Linkaging for research started from pork barrel funds. In 1961, the two-year technical agriculture post-secondary course was opened, and in 1963, the Health Center was built out of funds from the Philippine Charity Sweepstakes

Office (PCSO). By that time, TNAS already had a school hymn and a student publication, "The Carabao."

In 1965, TNAS and Tarlac School of Arts and Trades (TSAT) were merged to become the Tarlac College of Technology. TNAS became TCT-College of Agriculture (TCT-CA), while TSAT became the Tarlac College of Technology – College of Arts and Trades (TCT-CAT) by virtue of RA 4337.

three-degree TCT-CA offered programs: Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education major in Elementary Agriculture or Home Economics (BSEEd); Bachelor of Science in Agriculture (BSA) major in Crop Science/ Animal Science, and Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Engineering (BSA Eng'g). Government programs related to agriculture, especially after the declaration of Martial Law in 1971, gave a boost to the enrollment in these courses. Graduates found immediate employment here and abroad. From all indications, the school could well become autonomous.

Thus, on 18 December 1974, by virtue of PD 609 issued by President Ferdinand E. Marcos, the Institution was created as a state college. The first College President was Mr. Jose L. Milla. During President Milla's stewardship, the campus area was increased to 60 hectares; a forestry laboratory in Titi Calao, San Jose, Mayantoc was acquired through PD 1506; Fishery was added to the existing production projects and joint researches with IRRI were undertaken. Enrollment further increased as well as the number of faculty and non-teaching personnel.

The second College President was Dr. Robustiano J. Estrada. Upon his assumption, the ten-year development program and the TCA Code were prepared. There was a major reorganization in the administrative setup of the College. Two vice presidents were designated: the Vice President for Administrative and Business Affairs took care of the non-academic staff and functions while the Vice President for Academic, Cultural, and Sports Affairs was in-charge of the academic programs based in different institutes under a Dean. There was an exodus of faculty to take graduate studies because of the promotion scheme of state universities and colleges that gave highest points to educational attainment.

development was Infrastructure also accelerated under Dr. Estrada's administration. Academic buildings rose to accommodate enrollment that reached thousands, and which increased every year. Twenty-one faculty cottages, the Girl's Dorm and Boy's Dorm, a guest house, sixdoor staff apartment, a research and development building, a multipurpose building, the administration building cum library, and the chapel were all constructed.

The old structures were repaired and PAGASA established an Agro-Meteorological Station. These gave a new look to the campus. By then, the campus had expanded to 70 hectares, including a four-hectare athletic oval. Research and extension also expanded, and TCA became a byword among households in the service area. The production projects also increased notably, rice, vegetables, piggery, poultry, goat, cattle, nursery, fruit trees, seedlings, and canteen service.


Dr. Feliciano S. Rosete became the 3rd President of TCA when Dr. Estrada's term expired in 1989.

During the first five years of Dr. Rosete's term, other infrastructures came about. The landmark was the Farmers' Training Center built from the Countrywide Development Fund (CDF) of then Senator Alberto G. Romulo. It was also during Dr. Rosete's term that scholarships from private individuals and NGOs started pouring

in, and more curricular programs were offered. Extension and research accomplishments also multiplied.

In 2001, Dr. Philip B. Ibarra became the 4th President of TCA. His administration is noted for sustaining the gains and glories of the past while working out for more. TCA then was notable for revolutionizing its curricular offerings, computerization of enrolment and administrative system, aggressive accessing of financial and material resources, development of new leaders, aggressive accreditation programs, and strengthening existing partnerships with local and international organizations. All these initiatives have pushed TCA to be the Best Institution through Transparent and Caring Administration. In 2008, he was awarded as one of the recipients of the "Pagasa" award, recognizing his exceptional service in masterful stewardship of the college's human capital. This prestigious award is given to the civil servants who have made valuable contributions that have directly benefited more than one department of the government through innovative ideas or outstanding performance.

On 14 January 2010, Dr. Max P. Guillermo, assumed the presidency



of the Institution. He pursued a new strategic planning initiative: TCA @ 2015 that outlined the formulated institutional plans, based on strategic programmatic strengths supported by a comprehensive development plan to make the then TCA an energized incubator of new ideas and center of innovation. Significant milestones in the realization of the vision to be a recognized higher education institution in the Southeast Asian Region are greatly demonstrated during the second term of Dr. Guillermo.

His term is characterized by more aggressive and more vigorous actions all directed toward its persistent pursuit of quality and excellence. Intensified mechanisms in the realization of the Institution's quest for quality assurance are the landmark accomplishments Guillermo's administration. of Dr. It is under his administration that the Institution had been awarded an institutional accreditation status making a record as the first AACCUP Institutionally Accredited State College in the Philippines, the second SUC granted institutional accreditation by AACCUP under the outcomes-based quality assurance (OBQA) paradigm, and the fourth SUC awarded institutional accreditation status by AACCUP. As it strives to achieve the highest levels of excellence in delivering higher education, TAU has also undergone Institutional Sustainability Assessment (based on CMO No. 46, s. 2012) conducted by CHED.

On 1 January 2016, the Agriculture Education of the College of Agriculture and Forestry was designated by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) as Center of Development (COD), whereas the Teacher Education programs of the College of Education were certified by CHED as Center of Excellence (COE) effective 1 April 2016. Furthermore, all the 23 program offerings of the University are already accredited, most of which are submitted for higher accreditation status.

On 10 May 2016, a major historical leap for the TCA has been taken as it was officially converted into Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) by virtue of Republic Act No. 10800, "An Act Converting the Tarlac College of Agriculture in the Municipality of Camiling, Province of Tarlac into a State University to be Known as the Tarlac Agricultural University," signed by His Excellency President Benigno S. Aquino III.

TAU is mandated by law to provide advanced education, higher technological, professional instruction and training in the fields of agriculture, agribusiness management, science and technology, engineering, teacher education, non-traditional courses, and other relevant fields of study. It shall also undertake research, extension

services, and production activities in support of the development of the Province of Tarlac and provide progressive leadership in its areas of specialization.

The change in status and shift in perspective pose immense challenges to TAU, to which an effective, in-depth, well-planned, and well-executed strategic development plan is imperative to sustain quality, competence, and competitiveness in agricultural

development plans, TAU launched massive infrastructure projects as an evident change to prepare the University for its future endeavors. These projects were designed to cater to the ever-changing needs of its stakeholders. The rise of new structures and rehabilitation of existing buildings that house well-ventilated and spacious classrooms together with well-equipped laboratories has been a priority of the University administration.

The TAU Strategic Development Plan (2016 to 2025) has been crafted through the stakeholders' combined wisdom and vision for TAU. It serves as the blueprint of the ten-year strategic directions carefully laid out to realize the University's breakthrough goals.

Reaping all the success from several years of hard work, the University has been declared as a Level IV State University, as per the CMO No.12, s. 2018, and in accordance with the DBM-CHED Joint Circular No. 1 s. 2016, otherwise known as the FY 2016 Levelling Instrument for SUCs and Guidelines for the Implementation Thereof. Having been recognized as a Level IV State University, TAU achieved

excellence in undertaking the full range of its functions as a state university, namely, instruction, research, and extension manifested through teaching effectiveness, research competence, active community services, and efficient management of resources.

With aspirations to create a space in the global academic map, the University has intensified and strengthened its global partnerships, linkages and collaborations to expand

All of these also ushered diversified avenues for international (cross-border) mobility of students and professional advancement of faculty members.

Pres. Guillermo's administration continues to envision TAU among the premier universities in the country that follows statutory regulations and international standards of quality assurance and management. The Research, Extension and Training Office submitted its processes and

threat of the global pandemic. The ACS Worldwide Works Solutionz granted TAU with ISO 9001:2015 certification in instruction, research, extension and training, production, administration and support services last 18 November 2021. The certification is valid until 12 December 2024. This milestone reveals the serious commitment of the present administration to carve a path that would enable TAU to be at par with prestigious universities in the country and overseas.

In 2021, TAU achieved another milestone when it was bestowed with a Three-Star rating by Quacquarelli Symonds (QS), which serves as a testament to the University's commitment to excellence and its relentless efforts to meet performance benchmarks aligned with international standards. Additionally, TAU received a Five-Star rating in Academic Development, Social Responsibility, and Inclusiveness.

In the same year, Tarlac Agricultural University became the first state university in the Philippines to be ranked by the Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings placing 601-800 internationally and third, country wide. This recognition coincided with the inclusion of TAU in the World University Rankings for Innovation (WURI), ranked 101-200 in 2021, and UI Green Metrics, ranked 317, in 2022.

Ushering a new era for TAU, Dr. Silverio Ramon DC. Salunson assumed the TAU Presidency on 2 June 2024. To foster a new 10-year strategy framework, TAU shall be at the forefront of SMART Agriculture development and in the promotion of its core values: resiliency, agility, innovation, sustainability, and excellence. TAU also widens its academic programs by approving the offering of BS Exercise and Sports Science.

In 2024, TAU has once again secured the approval of World Universities with Real Impact (WURI) as it ranked 10th globally and 7th among Philippine Higher Education Institutions. In the same year, TAU also captured the 324th spot in the UI GreenMetric World University Rankings, cementing TAU's reputation as a progressive institution dedicated to sustainable development and real-word impact.

TAU has continuously demonstrated a strengthened global and countrywide standing in 2025, showcasing a profound commitment to sustainability, innovation, and impactful education through its impressive performance in several prestigious international rankings. The University earned its new spot in the THE IR at the 1001-1500 position, while also being tagged under "Reporter" status in the THE World University Rankings.

The Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) community marks another milestone in its academic excellence as alumna Ms. Cheska D. Orosco secures 2nd place in the rigorous Certified Human Resource Associate (CHRA)™ Assessment Examination - Batch 54. This achievement underscores TAU's mission to develop globally competitive professionals ready to excel in their chosen fields.

A 2024 graduate of Bachelor of Science in Psychology (BSP), Orosco demonstrated exceptional proficiency in the December 22 examination, earning an outstanding 92.75% rating. She described the assessment as challenging, covering HR practices, labor laws, and real-world scenarios that demanded both comprehensive

preparation and practical understanding.

Administered by the Human Resource Educators' Association of the Philippines (HREAP), the CHRA™ exam evaluates foundational HR knowledge, with this year's batch achieving a 74.82% overall passing rate. Conducted both online and in-person across multiple venues, the assessment sets a high standard for aspiring HR practitioners. Alongside Orosco, Ricah Jane Yala Bo, a BS Business Administration graduate, also passed the examination, further highlighting TAU's strength in producing skilled professionals.

This success reflects the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) and College of Business and Management (CBM)'s dedication to academic rigor and student growth. By equipping graduates with both theoretical knowledge and practical skills, TAU continues to establish itself as an institution that fosters career-ready excellence.



2024 INTERNATIONALIZATION (IZN) CHAMPIONS OF NATIONAL-BUILDING AND SUSTAINABILITY (ICONS) AWARDS

The Commission on Higher Education (CHEd) lauded the efforts of Philippine Higher Education Institutions (PHEIs), including Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU), for their contributions to advancing internationalization in the higher education sector. This recognition took place during the 2024 Internationalization (IZN) Champions of Nation-building and Sustainability (ICONS) Awards at the Philippine International Convention Center (PICC) in Pasay City on 16 December. The event highlighted the achievements of globally ranked institutions that help elevate the Philippines' standing in the international academic community.

TAU earned distinctions for its performance in the 2024 Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings and the World University Rankings for Innovation (WURI). In the THE Impact Rankings, TAU sustained its position as Region III's top higher education institution. The University achieved a global rank within the 801-1,000 bracket and placed 9th among 56 Philippine HEIs, with a score of 60.9 points, underscoring its commitment to global competitiveness.

For the fourth year in a row, TAU secured a spot in the WURI Global Innovative Universities, falling just short of the Global Top 100 by 10 ranks. Nationally, it placed seventh among 65 PHEIs and led five universities from Central Luzon. These accomplishments reflect TAU's consistent pursuit of innovation and its alignment with international standards that emphasize creative approaches in education and governance.

These achievements highlight TAU's dedication to integrating the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) into its programs, initiatives, and institutional priorities.




INTERNATIONAL AND LOCAL RECOGNITIONS

The Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) continues to demonstrate excellence through the remarkable achievements of its faculty and staff.

Dr. Amy Lizbeth J. Rico, a faculty member from the College of Engineering and Technology (CET) and General Manager of the TAU SMART Agriculture Center, has qualified as one of the top 16 finalists for the prestigious 2024 Metrobank Foundation Outstanding Filipinos Award for Teachers in Higher Education, a testament to her dedication to instruction, research, and community service.

Meanwhile, Ms. Aira F. Waje, a faculty researcher from the College of Agriculture and Forestry (CAF) and Director of the Rootcrops Research and Training Center (RRTC), has gained international recognition with her scholarly works featured in Springer Nature's Compendium of Phytopathogenic Microbes in Agro-ecology, highlighting TAU's contributions to global agricultural research.



Additionally, TAU was honored with the Gawad KALASAG Seal for being one of Central Luzon's most disaster-resilient institutions. These accomplishments reflect the unwavering commitment of TAU's faculty and staff to academic excellence, innovation, and community service, reinforcing the university's reputation as a



WORLD UNIVERSITY RANKINGS FOR INNOVATION (WURI) 2024





In the Symbol and Promotion category, TAU's Green and Global program, a collaboration between the External Linkages and International Affairs (ELIA) and the Planning and Development Office (PDO), secured the 35th spot. The initiative highlights TAU's sustainable infrastructure designs and internationalization efforts, reinforcing its strong digital and social media presence.

Additionally, the Business and Auxiliary Services Office's ACCELERATE program, supporting student-led startups, ranked 72nd in Entrepreneurial Spirit, addressing pandemic-related challenges for small businesses.

TAU submitted eight entries across 13 categories, with other notable projects including an International SDGs Bootcamp, a crisis management system, and women's empowerment programs.

The WURI rankings, managed by Switzerland's Institute on Policy and Strategy, assessed thousands of submissions from 1,072 universities through rigorous peer and expert evaluations.

Among 65 Philippine Higher Education Institutions (PHEIs) evaluated, TAU ranked 7th nationally and emerged as the topperforming university in Central Luzon.

TAU earned recognition in three specialized categories, showcasing its commitment to student welfare, branding, and entrepreneurship. Its suicide prevention program, RACE Against Suicide, developed by the Office of Student Services and Development (OSSD), placed 17th in Student Support and Engagement. The initiative emphasizes mental health awareness, counseling, and proactive intervention strategies.

RANK 324 IN THE WORLD RANK 5 IN THE PHILIPPINES

The Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) has delivered an outstanding performance in the 2024 UI GreenMetric World University Rankings (UIGM WUR), climbing 153 spots to secure the 324th position globally. This impressive jump from its previous rank of 477th places TAU at 173rd in Asia, 5th in the Philippines, and 1st in Central Luzon, reinforcing its reputation as a pioneer in sustainability and eco-friendly campus initiatives.

TAU's remarkable progress reflects its mission to advocate for environmental conservation and green innovation. Key projects such as the Calao Forest Reserve, engineered bamboo facility, Bambusetum, and SMART Agriculture Center highlight the University's leadership in sustainable development. These efforts, alongside robust academic and research programs, contribute to ecological balance and community resilience, setting a benchmark for other institutions.

In this year's rankings, TAU excelled in multiple categories, placing 3rd in the Philippines for Setting & Infrastructure and Energy & Climate Change, 9th in Transportation, 13th in Water Management, 15th in Waste Treatment, and 22nd in Education & Research. These results underscore TAU's longstanding commitment to operational efficiency and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), further solidifying its position among the country's top sustainable universities.

The 15th UIGM WUR evaluated 1,477 universities from 95 countries, with results announced on 12 December in São Paulo, Brazil. This prestigious ranking serves as a catalyst for institutional growth, quality assurance, and global competitiveness, encouraging universities worldwide to intensify their sustainability efforts.

TIMES HIGHER EDUCATION (THE) IMPACT RANKINGS 2024



Despite a significant increase in the number of participating private higher education institutions (PHEIs), Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) has achieved a notable position in the Top 801-1,000 range of the 2024 Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings. Announced on 12 June by the London-based ranking body, this accomplishment reinforces TAU's standing as Central Luzon's premier higher education institution (HEI).

Scoring 60.9 points overall, TAU secured its place among 1,963 global universities, while also ranking 9th nationally alongside seven others Philippine HEIs. A total of 57 PHEIs were evaluated, highlighting TAU's competitive performance. The University particularly excelled in SDG 17: Partnership for the Goals (59.2 points), recognized for its sustainability reports, cross-sector collaborations, and Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) initiatives.

Additionally, TAU performed strongly in SDG 5: Gender Equality (58.8 points), praised for its women-centric admission policies. TAU's long-standing commitment to SDG 1: No Poverty (54.4 points) and SDG 2: Zero Hunger (53.8 points) remains a key strength. Since 2021, the University has consistently ranked among the top Philippine HEIs in these areas. Its student financial aid programs and community anti-poverty initiatives contributed to its high score in SDG 1, while its agricultural expertise reinforced its leadership in food security (SDG 2). Nationally, TAU placed 4th in SDG 1, 3rd in SDG 2, 5th in SDG 5, and 14th in SDG 17.

The rankings were based on 2022 data across all 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Although TAU previously ranked in the 601-800 bracket, this year's results mark another milestone in its 78-year history. Notably, TAU was the first Philippine state university to be included in the THE Impact Rankings in 2021, showcasing its enduring commitment to global sustainability standards.

ISO 9001:2015 QUALITY MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (QMS) RECERTIFICATION



Following a rigorous day-long audit, Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) has once again achieved ISO 9001:2015 Quality Management System (QMS) recertification, officially granted on 9 December. This milestone reaffirms TAU's commitment to maintaining global standards in quality management and institutional excellence.

University officials and department representatives underwent a thorough evaluation of critical ISO 9001 components, including strategic planning, operational controls, performance monitoring, and compliance verification. The audit also examined management review processes to ensure continuous improvement across all university operations. While the audit revealed no major nonconformities, the experts provided valuable recommendations for further enhancing the university's QMS processes.

Prior to the audit, a discussion on aligning TAU's organizational strategies with ISO 9001:2015 requirements was conducted. Key topics included assessing stakeholder needs, defining the QMS scope, and reinforcing leadership's role in maintaining a customer-centric approach and adherence to quality policies.




Despite being one of the smallest state universities in the Philippines with just around 7,000 students, Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) proved that size does not define success. The University's athletes, coaches, and administrators turned this perceived disadvantage into motivation, delivering an outstanding performance at the SUC III Olympics. Their hard work resulted in an impressive haul of 26 gold, 40 silver, and 32 bronze medals, showcasing TAU's growing prominence in regional sports.

This historic medal count reflects TAU leadership's unwavering commitment to youth sports development, which extends beyond competitions to promoting health and wellness. The athletics team led the charge, contributing 13 golds, 28 silvers, and 12 bronzes.

TAU's archers also made their mark, earning 9 golds, 6 silvers, and 2 bronzes, and placed second overall in archery, with Alyssa R. Felipe dominating as a multi-medalist.

In 2023, TAU secured 97 medals (30 golds), and this year's performance further cemented its reputation as a rising force in collegiate sports. After successfully hosting the SUC III Olympics for two consecutive years, TAU now hands over the responsibility to Pampanga State Agricultural University (PSAU), which will host the 2025 edition.

As the University looks ahead, its athletes and coaches remain determined to build on this success and aim for even greater achievements in future competitions.

Demonstrating its unwavering commitment to quality teacher education, Tarlac Agricultural University's College of Education (TAU-CEd) has once again proven its mettle by surpassing national passing rates in the September 2024 Board Licensure Examination for Professional Teachers (BLEPT). The Professional Regulatory Commission (PRC) released the results on 13 December, showcasing TAU-CEd's exceptional performance at both elementary and secondary levels.

TAU-CEd's first-time takers in the elementary level achieved a remarkable 100% passing rate (43 out of 43), contributing to an overall passing rate of 91.49% (43 out of 47). In the secondary level, first-time examinees secured an impressive 96.08% passing rate (49 out of 51), resulting in a 71.62% overall passing rate (53 out of 74). These outstanding results highlight the college's dedication to producing highly competent educators.

The national passing rates announced by PRC and the Board for Professional Teachers (BPT) stood at 45.51% (20,025 out of 44,002) for elementary and 56.88% (48,875 out of 85,926) for secondary levels. Conducted on 29 September across 40 testing centers in the Philippines and Thailand, the examination saw TAU-CEd graduates significantly outperforming these national benchmarks.

This accomplishment reinforces TAU-CEd's status as a Center of Excellence in Teacher Education. continuing its legacy of producing outstanding educators for the nation.

SUSTAINABILITY AT TAU



Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) stands as a beacon of sustainable development, seamlessly integrating the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) into its academic, research, and community engagement initiatives.

Through a multi-pronged approach, TAU addresses poverty, hunger, health, education, gender equality, environmental sustainability, and global partnerships, ensuring that no goal is pursued in isolation but as part of an interconnected framework for progress.

At the heart of TAU's mission is the fight against poverty (SDG 1) and hunger (SDG 2). Programs like the Binhi ng Pagasa Summit and Goat Production Training equip farmers and youth with sustainable livelihood skills, directly improving food security and income opportunities.

Meanwhile, the High-Quality Rice Production Training and SMART Derby on High-Value Crops enhance agricultural productivity, ensuring resilient food systems that align with zero-hunger targets. These initiatives not only uplift rural communities but also promote health and well-being (SDG 3) by fostering nutrition-sensitive farming practices and raising awareness on public health issues through events like the Beyond the Rainbow Festival, which addresses HIV prevention and mental health inclusivity.

Education (SDG 4) and gender equality (SDG 5) are central to TAU's institutional ethos. The University's Clerk Training Program and Global Citizenship Education Conference exemplify its commitment to lifelong learning and global awareness, while the CODI Manual on Gender-Based Misconduct and Beyond the Rainbow Festival create safe, inclusive spaces for all genders.

These efforts are complemented by initiatives like the Lasallian LIFE Partnership, which explores renewable energy solutions (SDG 7), and TAU's participation in BizConEx 2024, which supports MSMEs in adopting sustainable technologies (SDG 8), demonstrating how education and economic growth are intertwined with environmental and industrial innovation.

Environmental sustainability is another pillar of TAU's SDG-driven agenda. The Green SONA and Tarlakauayan Bamboo Festival highlight the University's leadership in climate action (SDG 13), sustainable cities (SDG 11), and life on land (SDG 15) through bamboo reforestation and disaster-resilient urban planning.

The E-Bamboo Musical Instruments Project and ATI Training on Farm Mechanization further underscore responsible consumption (SDG 12) by promoting eco-friendly materials and reducing agricultural waste. These projects also protect aquatic ecosystems (SDG 14) by minimizing chemical runoff and advocating for watershed conservation.

Underpinning all these efforts is TAU's commitment to uphold strong institutions (SDG 16) and global partnerships (SDG 17). The International SDGs Bootcamp unites Asian universities in sustainability dialogues, while collaborations with agencies like DA-ATI, DOST, and NGOs amplify impact through shared expertise. By weaving these goals into every program from Strategic Foresight Training for anticipatory governance to Sweetpotato Technology Tie-Ups for inclusive growth, TAU models how higher education can drive systemic change.

TAU's work transcends individual SDGs, embodying a synergistic approach where poverty reduction feeds into quality education, gender equality strengthens economic growth, and environmental stewardship safeguards future generations. As a hub of innovation and inclusivity, TAU proves that sustainable development is not a checklist but a collective journey, one that it navigates with vision, collaboration, and unwavering commitment to a greener, fairer world.





ENROLLMENT TREND

The enrollment trend from the 2nd Semester of Academic Year 2023–2024 to the 1st Semester of Academic Year 2024– 2025 reflects the University's steady academic engagement across its colleges, with a total of 12,660 students enrolled across the reported terms.




Figure 1. Number of enrolled students per college/semester

During the 2nd Semester of AY 2023-2024, the University recorded a total of 5,719 enrollees. Leading the colleges was the College of Agriculture and Forestry with 2,055 students, representing the highest enrollment during this term. The College of Business and Management followed with 1,351 students. The College of Arts and Sciences had 734 enrollees, while the College of Engineering and Technology reported 611. The College of Education had 513 students, and the College of Veterinary Medicine recorded 455.

In the mid-year term of the same academic year, a total of 945 students were enrolled, a number considerably lower than in the regular semesters. As expected, this decrease is due to the nature of the midyear term, which primarily accommodates summer courses and special classes. The College of Agriculture and Forestry again posted the highest number at 553, which accounted for more than half of the total midyear enrollment. The College of Veterinary Medicine and the College of Engineering and Technology followed with 143 and 131 students, respectively. Other colleges—Arts and Sciences (87), Business and Management (31), and Education (0)—had limited participation, consistent with typical midyear offerings.

By the 1st Semester of AY 2024–2025, the University saw a slight increase in total enrollment, rising to 5,996 students. The College of Business and Management recorded the highest enrollment this term with 1,585 students, overtaking the College of Agriculture and Forestry, which had 2,055 students in the previous semester but dipped slightly to 1,909 this term. The College of Arts and Sciences increased its enrollment to 821, while the College of Engineering and Technology also experienced growth, enrolling 647 students. The College of Education grew to 569 enrollees, and the College of Veterinary Medicine rose slightly to 465. This upward trend across nearly all colleges demonstrates a healthy start to the new academic

PERFORMANCE OF GRADUATES IN LICENSURE EXAMINATIONS



TAU kicked off the year with outstanding results in the Licensure Examination for Professional Teachers (LEPT). The University achieved a 57.14% passing rate at the elementary level and 60.53% at the secondary level, both exceeding the national averages of 46.70% and 58.78%, respectively.

While no licensure exams were taken by TAU in the second quarter, the third quarter saw student participation in two key areas.

In the Psychometricians Licensure Examination, TAU achieved a 60.98% passing rate, reflecting strong preparation despite being just below the national average of 69.78%.

In the Food Technologists Licensure Examination on the other hand, the university posted a 37.50% passing rate, offering insights for further academic support and curriculum enhancement.

The final quarter of the year was marked by participation in multiple licensure exams, showcasing the diversity of TAU's academic programs.

In the September LEPT, TAU shone again with an impressive 91.49% passing rate at the elementary level and 71.62% at the secondary level, both significantly surpassing national averages of 45.51% and 56.88%.

In the Agricultural and Biosystems Engineers Licensure Examination, TAU posted a 50% passing rate, closely aligning with the national average of 56.34%.

Other examinations taken during this period include those for Veterinarians, Foresters, Geodetic Engineers, and Agriculturists, with results that reflect opportunities for strategic improvement and academic support. Despite challenges, TĂU's broad participation underscores its comprehensive program offerings and the dedication of its students and faculty.



One indicator of an academic institution's success is its ability to produce highly competitive graduates who can make significant contributions to the national workforce. Tarlac Agricultural University continues to uphold this commitment through its sustained efforts in academic excellence.

EMPLOYABILITY OF GRADUATES

In the graduate employability tracking of Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU), for the graduates of the TAU batch 2022 graduates, a total of 931 graduates were identified, of which 503 or 54% were successfully tracked. The data reveals significant insights into the employment outcomes of alumni across the university's colleges.

The College of Agriculture and Forestry (CAF) produced the highest number of graduates at 351, with 168 (48%) tracked. Among those tracked, 121 (34%) were employed, while 44 (13%) were underemployed. Only 3 graduates (1%) were reported unemployed, indicating a relatively favorable employability rate despite the moderate tracking success.

The College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) recorded 101 graduates, 46 (46%) of whom were tracked. Of these, 31 (31%) were employed, and 15 (15%) were underemployed, with no reported unemployment, reflecting a promising employment absorption rate.

The College of Business and Management (CBM) tracked 122 out of 223 graduates (55%), with 115 (52%) reported employed. Only 7 graduates (3%) were underemployed and none unemployed, highlighting strong job placement within business-related fields.

The College of Education (CED) demonstrated the highest tracking rate at 91%, with 87 out of 96 graduates tracked. More than half, 57 (59%), were employed, while 29 (30%) were underemployed. Only one graduate (1%) was identified as unemployed, showcasing the continued demand for graduates in the education sector.

The College of Engineering and Technology (CET) tracked 66 out of 126 graduates (52%). The data shows 56 (44%) were employed, and 10 (8%) were underemployed, with zero unemployment reported, indicating stable employment prospects in the field.

The College of Veterinary Medicine (CVM) had the lowest tracking rate at 41%, with 14 out of 34 graduates reached. Among them, 14 (41%) were employed, with no recorded underemployment or unemployment, suggesting a high employment efficiency.

Overall, of the 503 tracked graduates across all colleges, 394 (42%) were employed, 105 (11%) were underemployed, and only 4 (0.43%) remained unemployed. These figures reflect the University's consistent contribution to workforce development, with most colleges showing minimal unemployment and notable levels of employability. This data provides a foundation for further institutional efforts to enhance graduate career readiness and strengthen industry linkages.







The submission of instructional materials for the first semester of 2024-2025 reveals a strong commitment to resource sharing across the University, with an impressive overall submission rate of 90%. While most colleges demonstrated high participation, ranging from 88% to a perfect 100%, the College of Agriculture and Forestry (CAF) showed a comparatively lower rate of 79%. This data underscores a generally positive culture of material development and sharing within the institution, highlighting areas of excellence that can serve as benchmarks.

The robust submission rate carries significant positive implications for the academe. For students, access to a wealth of well-crafted instructional materials promises enhanced understanding, engagement with diverse learning styles, and greater opportunities for independent study, ultimately leading to improved learning outcomes. For teachers, a comprehensive collection streamlines lesson planning, ensures consistency in course delivery, and facilitates the implementation of varied teaching strategies.




Figure 6. Total number of scholars and enrolled students






Figure 7. Total number of grantees and enrolled students per semester

NUMBER OF GRANTEES OF SCHOLARSHIP




Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) continues to support students through various scholarship and grant programs. This shows the university's commitment to provide equitable access to quality education.

In 2024, a total of 161 students were awarded scholarships across the second semester of S.Y. 2023–2024 and the first semester of S.Y. 2024–2025. This represents 1.21% of the combined student enrollment of 13,272 during the said academic periods. Specifically, 99 scholars were recorded during the second semester of S.Y. 2023–2024, accounting for 1.52% of the enrolled students, while 62 scholars were reported in the first semester of S.Y. 2024–2025, comprising 0.92% of the enrollment for that term.

In addition to scholarships, the university significantly expanded its financial assistance through grant programs. The number of grantees surged to a total of 1,229 in 2024. This comprises 362 grantees (or 5.55%) in the second semester of S.Y. 2023–2024 and 867 grantees (or 12.85%) in the first semester of S.Y. 2024–2025. Overall, 9.26% of the student population received grant support during the reporting period.

These figures reflect the institution's ongoing effort to enhance educational inclusivity and provide financial support to deserving students, ensuring that economic challenges do not hinder academic success.

The University has successfully broadened its reach. This innovative strategy has enabled participation not only from nearby provinces but also from international locations.

These training sessions cover a wide array of topics, including education, agriculture, science and technology, health, gender and development, disaster risk management and preparedness, intellectual property rights, among others. Through these initiatives, the University remains committed to enhancing the knowledge and skills of its stakeholders while addressing pressing issues in various fields.

These resources were meticulously crafted to cater to the diverse needs of farmers, livestock raisers, business owners, organizations, researchers, and students alike.



Building a Resilient and Equitable University through Gender and Development (GAD) and Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM) Initiatives

Recognizing the challenges posed by a rapidly changing environment, Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) is committed to fostering readiness and ensuring the diverse needs of its stakeholders are met. This commitment is deeply instilled through the active mainstreaming of Gender and Development (GAD) across all university operations - ensuring a gender-responsive approach across all activities.

TAU was able to identify issues on GAD-related challenges, including:

- · Limited awareness on GAD and DRRM issues and concerns
- · Vulnerability of students to reproductive health issues and concerns
- Absence of gender mainstreaming policies
- Presence of gender bias
- Insufficient capacity of personnel to conduct activities with GAD perspectives

To effectively address these issues, the university actively participates in national advocacies events such as the National Women's Month Celebration and the 18-day Campaign to End Violence Against Women and their Children (VAWC). These efforts involve advocacy activities, various contests, extensive information dissemination, distribution of campaign materials, and specialized training-workshops. Furthermore, TAU consistently invests in stakeholder capacity-building through talks and discussions on crucial legislation like RA 11313 (Safe Spaces Act) and RA 9262 (Anti-Violence Against Women and their Children Act of 2004), alongside broader Gender Sensitivity and Equality training. Internally, the University has integrated policies promoting gender-fair language in the curriculum, ensuring safe spaces, mandating the use of sex-disaggregated data, and adopting the Harmonized Gender and Development Guidelines (HGDG).

As a proactive thrust, TAU joins in on the advocacy on empowering men as allies for women empowerment. Branded as MOVE-KATROPA (Men Opposed to Violence Everywhere - Kalalakihang Tapat at Responsible sa Pamilya), this advocacy aims to increase awareness on gender-biased violence and to capacitate men to be partners as we move towards gender equality.

Parallel to its GAD efforts, TAU actively capacitates its community in Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (DRRM). As part of its regular operations, the university instills effective management of risks and preparedness for disasters. In 2024, the roster of TAU emergency responders grew significantly with the addition of 73 employees and 106 students. Complementing this, the university maintains an Incident Management Team (IMT), activated for both planned events and disaster response.

Together, the emergency responders and the IMT demonstrate unwavering dedication, assisting the university in emergency preparedness and response for various significant events throughout 2024. These included Typhoon Pepito, the 1st TarlaKauayan Festival, the Mass Induction of Student Leaders, Ecovergence, the 2nd International SDGs Bootcamp, Ragsakan 2024, Commencement Exercises, the Presidential Selection Forum, and the Regional SCUAA Olympics. Furthermore, the university and its stakeholders actively participate in the quarterly Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill (NSED).

TAU further supports its stakeholders' learning and development in DRRM, ensuring their capacity to respond to disasters not only within the University but also in their respective communities. In 2024, a comprehensive lecture-orientation on DRRM was provided to 1,246 NSTP students. The university also facilitated participation in the following key trainings:

- DRRM Course for Public Sector (Batch 3)
 Pollution Control Officer Training
 Basic Occupational Safety and Health Training for Safety Officer 1
- 4. Integrated Planning on Incident Command System (Level 2)
- 5. Gender-responsive Training for Fire Emergency for NSTP and NSRC Students

These concerted efforts to foster inclusive development are underscored by TAU's outstanding achievements. The TAU Responders secured 3rd place in the Volunteer Groups category at the KALASAG Response and Rescue Challenge, while members of the TAU Red Cross Youth Council emerged as champions in the World First Aid Day Olympics. Reinforcing these accomplishments, TAU was once again recognized as a Regional Finalist for the Best Higher Education Institution for Special Awards in Disaster Risk Reduction and Humanitarian Assistance in the 24th Gawad KALASAG (Kalamidad at Sakuna Labanan, Sariling Galing ang Kaligtasan) Seal and Special Awards.

As we continue to work towards progress, these initiatives collectively embody one overarching vision: to ensure that no TAUian is left behind!

Planting Seeds: TAU Employees engage in Continuous Professional Development

In line with Tarlac Agricultural University's (TAU) commitment to excellence and the continuous professional development of its employees, numerous seminars, webinars, and training programs were attended throughout the year. These engagements covered diverse areas, including academic innovation, administrative efficiency, digital transformation, leadership development, and policy updates.

These learning activities were participated in both globally and across various regions of the country. A total 118 seminars were attended by 187 faculty members and 86 non-academic personnel.

The majority of the engagements consisted of conventions and conferences organized by national and regional government regulatory bodies; research and paper presentation forums; seminars, workshops, and training programs focused on advanced research techniques and contemporary methodological studies; and government policy updates. These programs have equipped TAU employees with essential skills and competencies that contribute not only to their personal and professional growth but also to the continued advancement of the institution.

Figure 9. Training sessions, seminars, and webinars attended by faculty and non-academic staff in 2024.



INTERNATIONAL LINKAGES AND PARTNERSHIPS

TAU's 2024 Internationalization Journey: A Lookback on Breakthroughs and Global Success

Over the course of sealing partnerships mutual and meaningful collaborations in the global arena, Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) has always been a trailblazer in forging internationalization efforts across global linkages, ensuring that every connection links to a greater purpose of strengthening and mobilizing its whole community.

relentless From the commitment of whole University administration navigating a globally competitive institution, the year 2024 has been a resounding success for TAU as another twentytwo (22) international linkages from different parts of the world have been added to the list of its growing partners - eight (8) of this came from the North Àmerican region, twelve (12) from the Asian region, and one (1) each from the areas of Europe and Australia and Oceania.

Through these partnerships, TAU continues to provide avenues knowledge for exchange. collaborations, academic mobility, and global understanding among its partner educational institutions.

In 2024, several notable collaborations were established with renowned universities in the United States. The Catholic University of America, and The University of Maryland both entered into general academic

and research agreements with TAU, focusing on joint research and extension activities, academic exchanges, and co-sponsorship of training and seminars. These TAU's agreements denote growing commitment, presence, and recognition within the Northern American academic communities.

Significant efforts were also undertaken to fortify academic integration, especially within the Southeast Asian region. TAU formalized six partnerships with Indonesian universities, including Universitas Riau, Universitas Universitas Pancasakti Tegal, Sriwijaya, Universitas Mataram, Universitas Pamulang, Sekolah Tinggi Informatika & Komputer Indonesia (STIKI). This number signifies that Indonesia is the most engaged country in terms of depth and breadth of partnership, covering not just academic exchanges but also Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), intercultural immersion, and curriculum development.

Furthermore, the partnership with the Australian College of Studies (ACOS) focused on shortterm academic collaboration, including virtual guest lectures potential exchange opportunities. This reflects TAU's adaptability to diverse modalities international cooperation, including digital platforms and hybrid learning environments.

Moreover, TAU's connection

not only extend does universities but also to regional and international organizations and agencies. Its commitment to globally oriented education was further epitomized through its partnership with the Regulus International Consultancy Agency, Inc. (RICA), which opens doors of opportunity to TAU students who would like international experience internship programs, gearing them for global employability intercultural and exposure. Similarly, a partnership with Trade Alliances Canada Inc. (TAC) was established explore opportunities for student exchange and career advancement abroad.

Collectively, the proliferation of these linkages served a vital role in sustaining TAU's vision of becoming a smart agricultural with international university recognition while also upholding its reputation for credibility and quality among its international partners.

2024 is a remarkable year for TAU - a significant leap of its journey toward internationalization. As TAU gears for the coming years, it aims to sustain and further strengthen its global presence, linking to even more institutions that will bridge academic gaps beyond borders and promote global educational development.

INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

Building a Sustainable Future: TAU advances sustainability through SMART education, research, and production

In FY 2024, the University successfully completed four infrastructure projects designed to enhance holistic development and sustainable production both within and beyond its campuses.

The Student-Alumni Center now offers increased occupancy for psychological testing and counseling services due to the installation of drywall partitions. Furthermore, the improved mechanical deck area ensures a leak-free environment with easily accessible ventilation units, optimizing the facility's suitability for student activities.

The TAU Medical and Dental Clinic underwent significant repair and rehabilitation, resulting in an upgraded and expanded facility. It is now equipped with a pharmacy, secure file storage, designated ambulance equipment storage, and office spaces for medical personnel. The clinic also features a fourbed capacity observation and treatment area, as well as a dedicated isolation room.

The upgrading of the TAU Agrobiosystems Research and Development Laboratory and the project for the Development and Promotion of Smart Agricultural Technologies for Profitable Onion Production are intended to bolster the University's research capabilities. These enhanced laboratories will expand opportunities for researchers and partners to address critical challenges in agricultural biotechnology and production.

In FY 2024, the University commenced two projects slated for completion in FY 2025: the Upgrading of the College of Education Facilities (Laboratory High School Multi-purpose Area) and the Upgrading of the TAU Sustainable Lowland Vegetable Research and Production Area.

The upgraded multi-purpose area will serve as a student center, enabling laboratory high school students to enhance their skills through extracurricular activities such as sports and event organization. Simultaneously, the lowland vegetable research and production area aims to integrate permaculture systems within the university's existing built environment to promote self-sufficient agricultural production.

The University also commenced bidding for Phase 1 of the Upgrading of the College of Agriculture and Forestry Classroom Building. SUSTAINABILITY AT TAU

Tarlac Agricultural University (TAU) continues to advance its commitment to sustainability by successfully integrating environmental stewardship, agricultural innovation, and strategic partnerships. The University's achievements underscore a belief that effective sustainability must bridge academic instruction and technical research with community action.

In 2024, TAU co-hosted the Green State of the Nature Address (Green SONA) which served as a major platform to disseminate the ecological paradigm, gathering hundreds of participants to discuss critical issues from global warming and watershed importance to carbon neutral farming and the dangers of over-commercialization, reinforcing TAU's role as a regional leader in environmental education and awareness.









This commitment is physically manifested through employee and student participation in the National Clean-Up Month and the National Service Training Program's Waste Warriors initiatives, promoting responsible waste segregation and ensuring a conducive learning environment. Remarkably, TAU facilitated the annual Bamboo Planting Activity conducted in the 665-hectare forest reserve to directly contribute to carbon sequestration, with over a thousand propagules planted projected to capture at least 75,000 kg of carbon throughout their lifespan.



The foundation of TAU's operations relies heavily on Agricultural Sustainability and technological integration. Capacity building and human capital empowerment were demonstrated through the Vegetable Derby and Harvest Festival, a collaboration with the Department of Agriculture -Festival, a Regional Office III and the Bureau of Plant Industry, where 47 trainees learned about crop protection, product marketing, and basic finance, focusing on high-value crops grown in state-of-the-art controlled greenhouses.

Furthermore, the **Training of Trainers on High-Quality Inbred** Rice equipped 30 farmer-leaders in Region 3 with advanced mechanization and ICT technologies, promoting collective action and sustainable high-quality yield across the region. The University's commitment to instruction, research, production, and extension ensures continued focus on innovative farming methods and resource optimization.

Strategic Linkages are the cornerstone of TAU's outreach, ensuring that best practices are localized and scaled. Partnerships were strengthened through technical cooperation with the National Irrigation Administration (NIA) and Lukung Dam Irrigators Association of Concepcion Inc. (LIRAC), providing essential benchmarking and support for sustainable agriculture initiatives. Collaborative development with external academic institutions is also robust: TAU engaged Northwestern University to study natural heritage and partnered with Don Mariano Marcos Memorial State University to explore the establishment of a Sericulture Satellite Center and Bee Farm. This latter linkage recognizes the critical role of beekeeping in food production, rural livelihood, and biodiversity conservation. By consistently seeking partnership development, including exploratory meetings with organizations like the Lasallian Institute for the Environment (LIFE), TAU guarantees that its sustainability efforts are
